Dear people of St George's and St James',

As with Fr Peter I have been involved in the Inter-Faith movement for some years, and am currently the Chairperson of the Geelong Interfaith Network.

We are a small group with representation at the moment from Anglican, Uniting and Roman Catholic churches, the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, the Geelong Baha'i community, the Geelong Mosque, two local Buddhist communities, and a keen member of what used to be called Rev. Moon's Unification Church.

In the last couple of years, due to Covid, our main projects have been "zoom" dialogues about various subjects, where we have gathered 6 or7 speakers from different faiths to talk about a particular topic. In many of these dialogues we have found

considerable common ground – such as those about Racism, Prayer, the place of Religion in the world, Service and Sacrifice – but in the recent one, "What does your Faith believe about Life after Death?", we found many disagreements, as you can imagine. However, the conversations were conducted with respect. We all came away more enlightened about what others believe.

I have found that when one is confronted with what others believe, one's own faith is tested and strengthened. The Geelong Interfaith Network (G.I.N.) hopes to have a presence, as in previous years, at the February 2023 "PakoFesta"", the big multi-cultural festival in Pakington Street, Geelong West, and we are considering hosting in Geelong the annual state-wide Inter-Faith Festival scheduled for November 2023. A lot of work will be involved in organising that and we hope that Anglican parishioners will come and be part of it. One of our other challenges is to involve people from the Hindu and Sikh communities, a growing presence in the Geelong district.

We meet on the first Tuesday of each month , 5.30pm to 7pm, at the Belmont Library (and the meeting is on "zoom") and we always welcome enquirers and new members. See our website for more details. <u>www.geelonginterfaith.org.au</u>

¹⁰ Now he was teaching in one of the synagogues on the sabbath. ¹¹ And just then there appeared a woman with a spirit that had crippled her for eighteen years. Hello Friend --

The ARRCC team is excited that preparations have

begun for ARRCC's participation in the global Faiths 4 Climate Justice campaign this year. This time, we will be inviting you - and as many people as possible - to larger, flagship multi-faith events in Australian capital cities and some regional towns, as well as in some Pacific locations.

Details of our launch calls for Australian Faiths 4 Climate Justice actions are below. Save the date: **Thursday**, **September 1.** The large, multi-faith events will be held in the first part of October, on a date to be announced soon. We'll have a sound media strategy in which we seek to engage prominent religious leaders in championing our message. In a nutshell that message is, because vulnerable people everywhere are suffering so much from the worsening climate crisis, the Australian Government should:

- Stop approving new coal and gas projects
- End public subsidies for coal and gas projects
- Fully respect First Nations peoples' rights to protect Country
- Re-start contributions to the United Nations Green Climate Fund
- Assist extractive industry workers to prosper through jobs in sustainable industries
- Actively participate in creating a Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty.

Within Australia, the events will mainly be held in iconic places of worship, and will be preceded by whole nights spent by smaller groups in meditation, prayer, chanting and/or fasting. These will demonstrate to the public via mainstream national, local and religious media, the depth and strength of grassroots feeling on the issues being raised by the senior faith leaders. Partners in the Pacific are also planning events as part of the same day of action. Of course, the global Faiths 4 Climate Justice campaign will span over 40 countries from early October until COP27. It will involve some targeting of corporations, some targeting of governments, but all actions and events will include the demands of the Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty as a major theme. It's still possible that we hold some Faiths 4 Climate Justice actions targeting corporations here in Australia in addition to the above, as part of Move Beyond Coal.
