This seems like a cop out until it is seen in the context of salvation. No one can enter the Kingdom on his or her own merits. 
Games Day returns to St James, Point Lonsdale, Monday 3rd October.

GOSPEL OF THE DAY Luke 16.1-13

¹ Then Jesus said to the disciples, 'There was a rich man who had a manager, and charges were brought to him that this man was squandering his property. ² So he summoned him and said to him, "What is this that I hear about you? Give me an account of your management, because you cannot be my manager any longer." ³ Then the manager said to himself, "What will I do, now that my master is taking the position away from me? I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg. 4 I have decided what to do so that, when I am dismissed as manager, people may welcome me into their homes." 5 So, summoning his master's debtors one by one, he asked the first, "How much do you owe my master?" ⁶ He answered, "A hundred jugs of olive oil." He said to him, "Take your bill, sit down quickly, and make it fifty." ⁷ Then he asked another, "And how much do you owe?" He replied, "A hundred containers of wheat." He said to him, "Take your bill and make it eighty." 8 And his master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly; for the children of this age are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light. ⁹ And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of dishonest wealth so that when it is gone, they may welcome you into the eternal homes. 10 'Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much; and whoever is dishonest in a very little is dishonest also in much. ¹¹ If then you have not been faithful with the dishonest wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? 12 And if you have not been faithful with what belongs to another, who will give you what is your own? ¹³ No slave can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth.'

WHAT'S IN A WORD - JENNI'S GOOGLE WANDERINGS AND

During these historic times and as a bit of a night owl, I have been glued to the TV until the wee small hours watching the services, processions, and reflections for and of Queen Elizabeth II and the newly proclaimed King Charles III. Many words have been said which I, along with others, did not know the meaning of so Google has been my friend for the last week.

What's the difference between Accession and Coronation as King Charles is formally declared monarch?



Accession refers to the official process of a monarch taking office. Whoever is first in line to the throne officially becomes monarch the second their predecessor abdicates or dies, as the throne can never be vacant. Usually an Accession Council, is convened at St James's Palace London, within 24 hours of the death of a sovereign but in the case of King Charles III, it was delayed allowing him time to return from Balmoral, where the Queen passed away.

The event was accompanied by celebrations such as the firing of guns in Hyde Park and at the Tower of London, as well as blasts of fanfare played on trumpets.

While accession is a time for reflection and mourning, the coronation has a much more celebratory tone.

A **coronation** is simply the act of placing a crown on a monarch's head – they actually became King or Queen on Accession Day, which is typically long before this event.

It's not yet known when King Charles III's coronation will be – although Queen Elizabeth II's came over a year after she became monarch, so it's likely that the new King's crowning ceremony will not take place for some time.



<u>Another fun fact</u>-When new Australian coins are minted, Queen Elizabeth's image will be replaced by King Charles, but will face the other way.
